blessed are the poor in spirit

In Matthew, the Beatitudes describe how a disciple of Jesus can move into the gifts of the new age of GOD's victory over the power of death. The direction of GOD's blessing is surprisingly towards the marginalised ones, for such people are *'the apple of GOD's eye'* – they are the ones singled out for blessing and a share in the new age! The opening advice contradicts all the conventions of traditional wisdom teaching.

When the Gospel of Matthew was translated into Greek, *'anawim'* was translated as; *'poor in spirit'*. Luke's version of the Beatitude says simply; 'the poor'. The phrase in Matthew; *'poor in spirit'* creates confusion. Many interpret that it deals with spiritual poverty. But Jesus blesses the poor ones, telling them that GOD's realm will be their special privilege and dignity. The other Beatitudes seem to be only other ways of saying the same thing. In all of the Beatitude sayings, the same poor people are spoken of by other names and what the Beatitudes promise is the same. According to the Acts, there were no rich in the early Christian community, because the followers of Jesus shared everything – but neither were there any who were in need.

Those who had taken on the name *anawim* were so called not only because they were poor, but also because they experienced persecution. *'The Poor of the LORD GOD'* or *'poor in spirit'* – is the same as saying, *'the persecuted ones'*. The Beatitude states that everyone persecuted in the cause of justice is persecuted in Jesus' cause. It is no surprise that Jesus was crucified as a threat to the powers-that-be. Nor should it be a surprise to us if, in our age, healing comes only when the wound and hurt is acknowledged.

While the WORD of GOD is good news to the poor, the natural instinct of those of us who are not poor is to maintain our dignity, worth, sanity and probably our advantage! We allow our own efforts to take over, in order to hold our world together. But we come to the moment of worship with a different attitude; with the strange expectation that we will be turned about. The texts of the liturgy overturn our familiar world in the way our unexamined assumptions are always based on the alien ideology of human knowing and human control. True discernment of GOD's victory in Christ over the power of death, subverts our unexamined or mistaken assumptions. Thanks be to GOD! - BF

Tour on Palestine

NZ speaking tour on Palestine by Brother Peter Bray FSC, Vice-Chancellor of Bethlehem University founded by Br Peter's De la Salle Brothers in 1973. It was the first registered university established in the Occupied West Bank territory of Palestine and is the only Catholic university in the Holy Land. It currently has 3259 students (Muslim and Christian), 17,282 graduates and 214 faculty members. It celebrates its Golden Jubilee this year. Br Peter's speaking tour follows the New Zealand Catholic bishops publishing a statement last July urging action to solve the decades-old Israel-Palestine issue.
