Introduction

leader: Greet the people and name the Sunday of the Year (see above)

Acknowledge visitors and welcome them.

Announce the theme of the liturgy (see next)

Theme – The disciples come to understand their task: 'to be witnesses to the message and the resurrection of the Lord!'

leader: Today's gospel records

the Risen Jesus' appearance to the disciples. Jesus continues to seek out the company

of the poor and the outcast and eat with them.

The Risen Jesus, who searches out straying disciples,

is the same Jesus who sat down and ate

with the poor and the outcast.

They recognise him in the act of breaking bread and sharing fish.

Introduction to the first reading: (Acts 3: 13 - 15, 17 - 19)

leader: A disciple assimilates and lives 'into' the personal calling of their master.

Later, following a period of apprenticeship, the disciple is authorised to re-

present the master. Peter does that in this first reading from Acts.

Introduction to the second reading: (1 John 2: 1-5)

leader: The author is dealing with sucessionists within the community, who

although they claim communion with God, don't see the importance of

keeping commandments.

Gospel Acclamation:

all: Alleluia! Alleluia!

Lord Jesus, make your Word plain to us:

Make our hearts burn with love when you speak. Alleluia!

Introduction to the gospel reading: (Luke 24:35-48)

leader: Luke records Jesus appearing to Simon Peter; to two disciples on the road to Emmaus; and to the Eleven, who are joined by the disciples from Emmaus.

Homily Notes (presider)

- Exuberant joy is the proper way to live the Easter season. Easter is 50
 days long precisely because our joy in knowing that Christ is risen and
 we share his new life cannot be confined to or used up in just one day.
- Yet, the joy is paradoxical. In Luke's gospel, the disciples talking about the Resurrection are terrified when they see that what they are talking about and hoping for is really true. When Jesus appears and gives them a greeting of peace, everyone panics. He has to prove to them he is no ghost by having them touch him and by eating some fish.
- What would my reaction be to meeting someone I knew to be dead, someone whose corpse I had seen, someone whose grave I knew? Living in an age more inclined to psychological rather than spiritual explanations, I would probably think I was hallucinating rather than that I was seeing a ghost. Like the disciples, though, I would panic: "Am I cracking up?"
- Let's face it the resurrection is unbelievable. Even seeing the risen Lord
 is not going to convince us otherwise. It's easier to believe in ghosts or
 to doubt one's own sanity. Actually, we don't have to do the doubting
 ourselves; others do it for us. The wisdom of the world assures us that
 we're at least deluded and probably crazy in our belief that Jesus, once
 dead, is now alive.
- To understand the joy of this season, we must remind ourselves of the impossibility of what we celebrate. We know as well as the disciples did that Jesus really died. There was, and is, no doubt about it. Even if he had not been tortured to death on a cross 2,000 years ago, he'd be dead by now. We can be so used to the idea dof the resurrection that we can forget its basis, the death of Jesus. Unless we remember that, we cannot fully celebrate this season. It becomes mere good feelings and folklore.
- If we remember the fearsome reality of death, we are ready to rejoice over a piece of cooked fish. In the Resurrection, the impossible had happened. A dead man has returned to his friends spoken with them, shown his fatal wounds to them, eaten with them.
- And we are those friends.; The best friend I can ever have, because he knows me in every detail, in all my weakness, yet loves me without limit is Jesus Christ. His earlier friends, our forerunners, we're incredulous for sheer joy and wonder." In our own sheer joy and wonder, we remember how impossible it is that our friend is alive after being dead.
- He was dead he is alive. That in itself is cause enough to whistle,

whoop and dance. Yet, there is more to our joy. I will one day die. There is no doubt about it. The one statistic that never changes is the death rate. It is, and always will be, 100 percent. No medical technology, no cloning, no wonder drug, no diet, no exercise, no prayers, nothing will ever change that. One day, I will be as dead as Jesus was. Dead. Done. Full stop.

- And yet, through my really dying, I have a promise of new life in Christ's rising from death. United with Christ's death by the Baptism I renewed on Easter Sunday, I am united with his resurrection. In some way, though I will really die, I will also really live. That's as impossible for me as it was for Jesus. Incredible.
- Incredible, but true. Those men and women 2,000 years ago were incredulous in joy and wonder. So can we be. They saw Jesus, spoke with him, were taught by him, ate with him. The impossible, his living again, is real. The impossible, my living again is real. What else can I do but jauntily, joyfully stride through life?
- Well, actually, there is one more thing I can do. The end of today's gospel reading tells us Jesus said that 'penance for the remission of sins is to be preached to all the nations.' I can be a preacher. Not someone standing on a street corner haranguing the passing crowds, but someone whose jaunty walk through life, whose bewildered joy and wonder proclaim to all who see me the incredible, unbelievable good news that a dead man has eaten some fish. My dead friend is alive. I like him, will also die. And I too, will live.
